
State of the Skilled Labor Shortage in the Home Improvement Industry

Of rising interest has been the topic of a labor shortage of skilled tradespeople as a whole. To understand the current state of the skilled labor shortage as related specifically to the residential home improvement industry, our researchers at The Home Improvement Research Institute have been monitoring the implications of the skilled labor shortage since 2017.

Now, in 2023, here's where the situation stands:

Belief There Is a Shortage of Skilled Labor Across The Industry *vs.* Within Their Individual Business


Interestingly, we see a continuing trend over the last 3 years where fewer contractors believe they are short staffed in their own business, and yet also believe that the industry as a whole is facing a shortage in skilled labor. This aligns with the number of Pros who have been reporting either a "moderate" to "severe" labor shortage in recent years.




Have you had any Labor Shortages for Your Jobs Over the Past Month?

L -Low Shortage




Pros are resourceful by nature and tend to respond to a lack of skilled labor by making do with what they have by extending project timelines whereby they deploy fewer crew members per job site, increasing overtime opportunities for current crew, and taking on fewer projects.




While the presence of a limited number of skilled laborers does have impacts on contractors' businesses, in the greater context of all the challenges facing contractors right now, labor is of lesser concern than interest rates, recession, their sales close rate, and material availability.

What are the Top 3 Challenges Facing Your Business?



Labor is being reported as less of a challenge comparatively, likely because labor challenges have solutions that contractors can control - business levers that can be pulled individually - to create solutions. The more top of mind challenges they face are outside of contractors' abilities to make significant changes.
